TRUSTEES REPORT FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 JULY 2022

The Trustees present their fourteenth report along with the financial statements of the Company for the year ended 31 July 2022. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting polices set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Company's constitution document, he Charities Act 2011, the statement of recommended practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2015 (FRS 102) and the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

The Trustees, who are also directors of the company who served during the period are shown on page 1.

Trustees continue to be appointed in the following ways:

Sabbatical Trustees – up to two sabbatical trustees may be appointed by the secret ballot of the members to act for a term of not exceeding two years.

Student Trustees – up to two student trustees may be elected by a majority vote of the Student Council from those nominated by the Appointments Committee.

External Trustees – may be appointed by a simple majority vote of the Student Council from persons nominated by the Appointments Committee to serve a three-year term, with re-election possible for an additional term. The maximum term of office is six years.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Students' Union (SU) is a company limited by guarantee having no share capital, formed by its constitution document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and under the Companies Act 1985 to 2006. the SU is a registered charity (charity number: 1153426), registered on 15 August 2013. The charity was established to serve its members, students at the University of Suffolk.

The Trustee Board are responsible for the SU's financial, legal and charitable affairs. The Student Officer Committee are responsible for the day-to-day running of the activities of the SU in conjunction with staff members. Those who served on the Student Officer Committee are elected annually by secret ballot of the members.

In April 2022, our CEO left the organisation for a new role. We were supported by an Interim CEO between May and October 2022, when our current CEO joined us.

Objectives and Activities

The objectives of the SU are to advance students' educational and social experiences whilst at the University of Suffolk and for the public benefit by:

- * Promoting the interests and welfare of students at the University of Suffolk during their course of study and representing, supporting, and advising students
- * Being the recognised representative channel between students and the University of Suffolk and any other external bodies; and providing social, cultural, sporting, and recreational activities and forums for discussion and debate for the personal development of its students.

Activity

Following the removal of most COVID restrictions, the SU has returned to pre-pandemic normality with on-campus events, in-person teaching, and students engaging with activities.

2022 saw the return of Welcome Week (previously known as Fresher Week), with events such as barbeques, freshers' ball, and brunch clubs filled with new and returning students.

However, we are still feeling the effects of the pandemic, as is the case nationally. Students are still mindful of spaces with lots of people, triggering aspects of ill mental health and concerns such as anxiety. For this reason, we have focussed on providing various events catering to students who also like to socialise with smaller groups of people through arts and crafts and the use of our social space.

The cost-of-living crisis has also shifted the focus of the SU and supporting its members through such turbulent times. We have found innovative ways of supporting our members through their educational experience by providing free breakfast, lunch and dinner meals. The social space is a source of warmth while, for example, attending movie nights and celebrating seasonal festivities. This campaign has been student-led, with students volunteering at events, packing lunch bags, and supporting our sabbatical officers' requests for support and relief, such as free student car parking.

The SU continues to receive a block grant from the University as its primary funding source. Future endeavours include focusing on other revenue streams to support the SU's plans for sustainable growth. Considerations include marketing, advertising, and collaborative partnerships with local lpswich and Suffolk businesses.

Shop SU and the social space

Whilst the social space has been in use and has seen much engagement, partly due to the University's Health and Wellbeing building opening nearby, the SU Shop has not performed as well as expected due to the cost of living crisis. The impact of the cost-of-living crisis is that students choose cheaper alternatives, like bringing in their own food or buying from larger suppliers with more competitive pricing strategies. The University has provided a further £5,000 in January 2023 to support the additional expenditures of the SU Shop. The SU is currently working with the University of Suffolk to explore alternative business models and is undertaking consumer research to understand what kind of services and products students want and the challenges that they face. It is understood that there is still a demand to be able to purchase food at a competitive price.

SU Representation

The focus on representation has been a huge priority for our staff this year. We have seen high numbers of student leadership across course reps, elected officials, club and society committee members, and student volunteers. Key events and campaigns include Reclaim the Night, Cost of Living Campaign, International Women's Day, and more. Moving forward, the team is looking into making our services even more student-led, empowering students to lead on initiatives and be a voice within democratic spaces. Alex Gooch is our President of Education, with incoming sabbatical officers coming into the post on 1 June 2023.

SU Opportunities

As part of our sabbatical officer's manifesto, social sports were free for students and have seen good uptake, particularly football, badminton, and Pilates. This has been well promoted through the officer campaigns to encourage social engagement during tough financial times for students and has provided a space for engagement for all students. We continue strengthening our BUCS teams, with more intake for Basketball, Netball and Football. We have won games against other universities, such as the School of Oriental and African Studies, and have a student representing the University in cross country. We have also seen more societies start this year, such as Hellfire Club (a Dungeons and Dragons society), ACS (African Caribbean Society), and the Students of Nigeria Society. Plans for an Islamic Society are also in the process.

SU Communications and Events

It has been a liberating year for communications and events as we have returned from a COVID-restricted world. This year has seen the return of our Welcome Week, with hundreds of students participating and meeting new people. We have also focused more on student celebrations, empowering and highlighting the amazing work our members achieve. Our attention has moved towards Instagram and TikTok in addition to our continuous efforts on Facebook to engage with the 18-24-year-olds, who comprise a high percentage of our current student body. We have used our social media channels to identify what our members need and have used this data to include more events that focus on well-being and social integration. This has been achieved through movie nights, walks, and food. Refreshers Week also went down incredibly well, with training provided for staff to ensure the night-time events were safe for our students when off campus.

SU Advice

The Advice Service continues to offer online and in-person appointments with allocated drop-in sessions for students who may need urgent support without an appointment. We have recorded over 500 unique cases from students within Ipswich and at partnership institutions. The service has also been trialling evening and weekend appointments to reach students who may be on placement (particularly Health students). The team have also used key campaign weeks, such as the Elections period and Welcome Week, to create drop-in 'coffee and cake' chats, sharing what the service offers to students who may be considering approaching the SU. Academic appeals continue to be the key area students have been supported with. An emerging theme comes from new student cohorts looking for preventative mental health support; this is an activity we will invest in for the upcoming year.

Financial Review

Management accounting was undertaken throughout the year, made available within Trustee Board papers, and presented to the Board at each meeting.

The gross income of the SU totalled £421,377, comprised mainly of the University's block grant contribution. Additional income through our marketing function has been low.

- * Prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue its operations.

The Trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2015 (FRS 102) and the provisions of the constitution. They are also responsible for safeguarding the charity's assets and taking reasonable steps to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

In so far, the Trustees are aware of the following:

* that the Trustees have taken all steps required to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditors are aware of that information.

Report of the Auditors to the Trustees & Members of the University of Suffolk Students' Union

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the University of Suffolk Students Union (the 'parent company') and its subsidiaries (the 'group') set out on pages 9 to 19, prepared in accordance with the policies set out on page 12 for the year ended 31 July 2022 and which comprise the statement of financial activities (incorporating a income and expenditure account), the balance sheet and related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- * give a true and fair view of the state of the group and charitable company's affairs as at the 31 July 2022 and of the group's incoming resources and application of resources, including it's income and expenditure for the 31 July 2022 then ended.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Conclusions relating to going concern

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the Companies Act 2006 requires us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- adequate accounting records have not been kept by the parent company, or returns adequate for our audit have not been received from branches not visited by us; or
- . the parent company financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or
- . certain disclosures of trustees' remuneration specified by law are not made; or
- . we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit; or
- the trustees were not entitled to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the small companies regime

Responsibilities of trustees

As explained more fully in the trustees' responsibilities statement set out on page 6 the trustees are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are responsible for assessing the group's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustees either intend to liquidate the group or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Extent of Procedures to detect irregularities

Discussions with and enquiries of management and those charged with governance were held with a view to identifying those laws and regulations that could be expected to have a material impact on the financial statements. During the engagement team briefing, the outcomes of these discussions and enquiries were shared with the team, as well as consideration as to where and how fraud may occur in the entity.

The following laws and regulations were identified as being a significance to the entity:

- Those laws and regulations considered to have a direct effect on the financial statements include UK financial reporting standards, Company Law, Tax and Pensions legislation.
- Those laws and regulations for which non-compliance may be fundamental to the operating aspects of the business and therefore may have a material effect on the financial statements including operating licences, environmental and health & safety legislation

Audit procedures undertaken in response to the potential risks relating to irregularities (which include fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations) comprised of: Inquiries of management and those charged with governance as to whether the entity complies with such laws and regulations; enquiries with the same about any actual or potential litigation or claims; inspection of relevant legal correspondence; review of board minutes; testing the appropriateness of journals, and the performance of an analytical review to identify unexpected movements in account balances that may be indicative of fraud.

No instances of material non-compliance were identified. However the likelihood of detecting irregularities including fraud is limited by the inherent difficulty in detecting irregularities; the effectiveness of the entity's controls, and the nature, timing and extent of the audit procedures performed. Irregularities that result from fraud might be inherently more difficult to detect than irregularities the result from error. As explained above, there is an unavoidable risk that material misstatements may not be detected, even though the audit has been planned and conducted in line with ISA's (UK).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 JULY 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention, and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities SORP 2015 (FRS 102) issued in January 2015 and the Companies Act 2006.

(b) Incoming resources

All income, unless received for a specific or restricted use has been credited to a general accumulated fund.

(c) Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Union to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

(d) Governance costs

Governance costs comprise the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the Union which relate to the general running of the organisation as opposed to to those cost associated with with fundraising or charitable activity.

(e) Donated services and facilities

University of Suffolk provides the Union with office space and sports facilities at no charge. As required by SORP 2015 (FRS 102), the donation of these facilities is included as an incoming resource and a matching outgoing resource within the statement of financial activities at the trustees' estimate of their value to the Students Union.

Irrecoverable VAT is charge

(g) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Expenditure on fixed assets is capitalised and valued at historic cost.

Depreciation is charged on capital expenditure and is written off at 25% per annum straight line on cost over the estimated useful life of the asset.

(h) Pension costs

Employees of the Company are invited to join a defined contribution to a money purchase scheme.

There was £210 (£144 - 2021) outstanding contributions at the year end. See note 8.

(i) Investments

Investments are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. All are held in the UK.

(j) Taxation

The company meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the company is exempt from taxation to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

The trading subsidiary is subject to the normal taxation rules.

(k) Operating leases

The cost of operating leases are charged as a cost in the statement of financial activities as these costs are incurred over the period of the lease.

(I) Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Union and which have not been designated for any other purpose.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donors or raised by the Union for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds is charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund are set out in the notes to the accounts to financial statements.
